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The Catholic Call to Stewardship

"How shall I make a return to the Lord for all the good he has done for me?" (Psalm 116:12)

As Catholics, God calls us to stewardship in Sacred Scripture and Church teachings. God created us in His image and likeness. Since the beginning, God has called us to be caretakers of His creation. We are called to live a life of gratitude. This means taking time each day to recognize that everything we have - our faith, families, friends, homes, schools, and churches - is a gift from God. He has given each of us gifts so that we might use them responsibly and generously. We can express our gratitude for His blessings through prayer and acts of kindness. When we use our gifts wisely and give from our "first fruits" - our first and best - we give our gifts back to God.

Stewardship is often described in terms of time, talent, and treasure. This means dedicating time to prayer and service, using personal talents in charitable ways to benefit our parishes and communities, and sharing financial resources to support the Church and those in need. Stewardship is returning a portion of our gifts - our time, talent, and treasure - to God. No gift is ever too small or insignificant.

"Make love your aim." (1 Corinthians 14:1)

When we receive the Eucharist, we are brought into communion with Jesus and with each other, living as one body in Christ. The Eucharist is a reminder of God's immense love and mercy. By offering our hearts and lives to God, we show our love and gratitude for His blessings and the gift of Jesus. Living a virtuous life helps us grow in holiness and deepens our love for God and others.

Stewardship is an expression of this love, closely connected with discipleship. It leads to evangelization when others witness faith in action through daily acts of love, service, and charity. When we are rooted in the love that binds us all together, our parish communities grow stronger.

"You will be enriched in every way for your great generosity." (2 Corinthians 9:11)

Discipleship in Jesus is a lifelong journey. With every step forward, we are challenged to be humble, trusting, and to accept God's will. By grounding ourselves in the spiritual practice of prayer, we can begin to see ourselves and others as God does. Through prayer, our minds and hearts will be transformed through a spirit of hospitality. As gratitude grows in our hearts, we see that we already have more than enough and that we have enough to share. Through a spirit of generosity, we return our gifts out of love and gratitude to God.

Together, we help God to build the Kingdom, and our small, individual acts can grow into something greater than we could ever imagine. As we live out the call to stewardship, our relationship with God will deepen, and we will witness growth and vibrancy in our parishes. In this way, we are enriched through the fullness of God's blessings.

The Season of Creation: A Season to Be Grateful!

By the time you read this, the Season of Creation will be underway! What is the Season of Creation, you might ask? This special time to reflect and celebrate God's Creation was called for by Pope Francis in 2015. In the midst of a crisis of Creation, it is a time to reconcile ourselves with the world around us. Spanning September 1 (the Day of Care for Creation in the Catholic liturgical calendar) until October 4 (the feast of St. Francis of Assisi, patron saint of Creation), the celebration of this time period has grown in recent years. The USCCB (United State Conference of Catholic Bishops) encourages the celebration of this season in our country, offering some suggestions on how we, as people who are one with God's Creation and stewards of Creation, can participate. Some of the ways that the Bishops offer are identifying reusable resources rather than relying on disposables, like grocery bags, dinnerware, etc., including a prayer of thanksgiving for the food that sustains us that comes from the earth before we eat, participating more fully in the celebration of the Eucharist in which all Creation is united, and reconciling ourselves with our hurting planet.

In our efforts here at Our Lady Queen of Peace, we recently hosted an evening celebration of the 10th anniversary of *Laudato Si'* (Care for Our Common Home), written by Pope Francis in 2015. Many people gathered for a sustainable meal, followed by a presentation on the impact that *Laudato Si'* has had, and finally an outdoor prayer circle to praise God for the gift of Creation. We also have transformed a few of the flower beds around the QP campus to pollinator friendly areas to help the animals that make growing our food possible. This fall, we will celebrate the new Mass for the Care for Creation at one of our new Wednesday 5:30pm Masses. This Mass text was recently released by the Vatican and was celebrated soon after by Pope Leo at an outdoor Mass. More opportunities to richly celebrate this Season of Creation will be coming, so let's stay in touch! We have so much to celebrate as members of God's Creation! In closing, pray with this text from the Canticle of the Sun.

The Canticle of the Sun

From the Canticle of the Creatures by St. Francis of Assisi, adapted by Marty Haugen.

The heavens are telling the glory of God, and all creation is shouting for joy! Come, dance in the forest, come, play in the field, and sing, sing to the glory of the Lord!

Praise for the sun, the bringer of day, he carried the light of the Lord in his rays; the moon and the stars who light up the way unto your throne.

Praise for the wind that blows through the trees, the seas' mighty storms, the gentlest breeze; they blow where they will, they blow where they please to please the Lord.

Praise for the rain that waters our fields, and blesses our crops so all the earth yields; from death until life her mystery revealed springs forth in joy!

Praise for the fire who gives us his light, the warmth of the sun to brighten our night; he dances with joy, his spirit so bright, he sings of you!

We are especially blessed by the leadership and pastoral care of **Fr. Brian and Fr. Jay**, whose presence in our classrooms, joyful interaction with students, and celebration of the Eucharist make our parish school feel like home. Their example reminds our students that the Church is not only a place we visit, but a community where we belong.

Our students are active participants in parish-wide service opportunities, from the CMC Meal Program and Luke House to the Allied Drive Giving Tree and the Respect Life Baby Bottle Drive. 

Ushering in Gratitude

There is much to be thankful for in our Queen of Peace community. The part of our community life that we should be most grateful for is gathering to celebrate the Eucharist, which is our thanksgiving as a gathered people to God. To celebrate our



liturgies fully and vibrantly, there are many hands that need to be involved, from various volunteers that lector, distribute communion, serve, greet, set up and coordinate the pieces of the liturgy, sing and play the piano and organ, and present the gifts of bread and wine on behalf of the community. One role that often goes unnoticed and is necessary for our celebration is the role of usher.

The usher ministry has a long history at Our Lady Queen of Peace. Many who are reading this will remember George Gibert, Queen of Peace usher captain for 48 years. George was extremely dependable – he set the bar high. When George decided to pass the head usher duty to someone else, Nick Beerntsen was the man for the job. Nick had ushered with George Gibert for a decade before he took the reins, so he was prepared to accept the challenge, with George at his side to assist in the first year.

As a parish community, we are grateful for the impact that Nick had on all of us.

Nick continued to set the bar high. He ensured ushers were not only prepared for our regular weekend Masses and that usher teams were full (with the usher captains' help) but was always on top of finding coverage for special events, Christmas, Holy Week, Holy Days, large funerals – anything that was needed. Nick also faithfully represented the QP Ushers on the Liturgy Commission for many years with Joe Keyes, one of the 5:00 pm usher captains. Nick brought practical wisdom and advice to the Commission's discussions. He was the first to offer his help to the Commission when something needed to be done.

This July, Nick was taken from this earthly life and entered eternal life with God. We are grateful for all that Nick did to make Our Lady Queen of Peace a safe and comfortable place for everyone by putting others' needs first. We remember the countless times he hung up his hat in the usher's room to get ready for ushering duty. Think of how many bulletins and worship aids Nick handed out and greeted us with! As a parish community, we are grateful for the impact that Nick had on all of us.

One of the ways we can consider sharing our gratitude is by sharing our gifts with others and by doing so, glorify God. Ushering is a perfect way to offer our time and gifts to God. A wish list item that Queen of Peace has had for many years is to increase participation in our usher ministry by 20 new ministry members. Ushering offers the opportunity to welcome fellow Mass-goers, help people find a comfortable seat in church, assist with taking up the collection, and direct our communion procession. As any usher would agree, ushering is a rewarding way to be an active participant in the liturgy and to find a place to belong in the usher family. As Nick would end his usher recruitment notices, "Ushering is for anyone – women, men, older teens to older folks – and doesn't require a large time commitment." Living the Journey God Has Laid out for You...

We are all on a faith journey; each of us ... set on a different road laid out by God. And we can choose to follow where God leads or not.

But sometimes it's hard to know where the journey is taking you ... or where you've been, exactly ... until you come to a sacred doorway.

And that's just what Nick Davidson and Liam Bruni are standing in right now: a sacred doorway. As members of the Verona Class of 2025, they are preparing to move off to college in the fall. Both were active in their faith lives in high school. Both were confirmed, both went on Mission Trip, both served on the St. Vincent de Paul Youth Council, both served on Team Jesus, both won the Parish Service Award (along with their good friend Davin Knudsen), and both have made plans for their academic life, social life, dorm life ... and faith life in college. Their recent pilgrimage with other young adults to Rome was a part of that sacred doorway into what is next: the doorway from high school into all that God has in store.

But what got them here?

What started their faith journeys that led them to want to spend their senior summer on pilgrimage to Rome?

I sat down with them both recently on a Saturday afternoon and asked them exactly that.

What sparked your journey of faith?

NICK: I was raised in the faith, my parents went to church (and they still do). We were involved, but it didn't really connect. It didn't' become my OWN until I was a part of the St. Vincent de Paul Youth Council,

serving hot chocolate down on State Street on a REALLY cold night my freshman year. We met some people who lived on the street – and we were just talking. It started out being about service hours, but when I was surrounded by other people my age who loved God and we were talking with people who had nothing, and laughing and serving, it changed everything for me. My faith became my own.

LIAM: Mine is similar but different. My family went to church regularly. I was raised in the faith, and then a few years ago I was at a retreat camp – at a YoungLife retreat. I heard one of the counselors do a witness talk about making your relationship with Jesus personal. I had prayed for a sign – a sign to know that all this faith stuff was real. And that witness talk was it. I sat with God right after that for like 15 minutes, crying, because suddenly – I got it. I knew that God was real and was with me. It set me on a path of daily devotion and wanting to know God more deeply every day and to help others know God too.

You just got back from a senior summer pilgrimage to Rome and Assisi. What was the highlight for you?

LIAM: For me it was coming up from the lower level into St. Peter's Basilica for the first time. Seeing the altar and the Papal throne illuminated by beams of sunlight was incredibly beautiful. It's gorgeous. And it's right THERE. I had been seeing it all my life on TV and in pictures – and now I was there. I'd love to go back and just be able to spend all the time I wanted in prayer in the different churches and basilicas ... there wasn't enough time to pray. I loved seeing all the places – like where Pope Francis is

buried in St. Mary Major – but I want to have more time to pray in those places.

NICK: I had two moments. One in Rome and one in Assisi. In Rome, the perfect holy moment was the Scala Sancta - the steps that Jesus walked on his way to meet Pilate. Tradition says you go up those steps on your knees. It was amazing! I just wanted more time to pray going up the steps. In Assisi, Liam and I and two other guys were sort of walking aimlessly in the streets of the city, and at the end of the road in the most random spot there was a ledge overlooking the beautiful countryside scenery. And there is a small church sitting right on the edge of that ledge and we went inside and it was beautiful but very small. We sat in there and prayed for awhile and it kind of spoke to me that whatever path you may take, no matter where you turn, God will always be at the end of it. And in the end, God is what's important.

Beautiful. So with everywhere you've been - literally and spiritually - what do you think God wants for your future? What are you hoping for in college? And how do you think God is calling you to use the gifts and talents you've been given to help others and to serve and give glory to God?

NICK: I know that two gifts I have right now are health and youth. I can use those two gifts to do what Jesus calls us to do: to help feed those who are hungry and clothe those who are in need and help provide shelter for those who are homeless. To use what I have to show people – all people – that God loves them. I can even do fundraising – like that hot chocolate sale with the St. Vincent de Paul Youth Council years ago. Being able to give tangible things to people who need them – all to show them that God loves them. I can do that.

LIAM: I want to show people that you can find God in joy. I want to use the gifts of faith and hope and joy to show people the true joy that comes from the love of God. I want to help other people find the path to God – the path God has laid out for them. THAT's the path to happiness, the path to finding your passion, the path to making others happy ... it's sharing the love of God.

Beautiful. Are you both sure you are only 18? What advice do you have for people who are younger (or older) than you who want to find their own path to a deeper relationship with God?

LIAM: Don't judge. Don't let what others have said about someone determine how you feel about them. Meet everyone as though you were meeting Jesus. How would you treat Jesus if you were meeting him?

It doesn't matter if they are younger or older or richer or living in a park – you are meeting Jesus and you can learn something from meeting them. We are all made in his image, we are all unique, and God loves each of us and wants us to love and look after each other.

NICK: My advice: Remember that we wouldn't be here if it weren't for God. We are called to live for God and give thanks to God every day by using everything we have been blessed with to serve others.

I sat thinking about these two young men I have known for over six years after they left that Saturday, and I came up with an idea.

So, here's my hope, and my plan:

Watch for the followup article to this one in four or five years when Nick and Liam are ready for the next sacred doorway, and we'll see where their faith journey has led them.

Until then, we'll try to follow your advice guys: Live the attitude of gratitude, and use the gifts and talents you've been given by God to share the love of God with those around us.
